Obituary

Stanley O'Connor (RIP) A life of service.

Stanley Passed away peacefully on 4th March 2022, aged 95 years. Beloved husband to Gladys' father to Susan and David and a much loved grandpa and greatgrandpa. Dearly missed by sister Margaret, sister-in-law Margaret and brother-in-laws Brian and Geoff.

Stan was born in 1926 and spent his childhood in Kendal. During his schooldays he was a keen member of the Air Training Corps and so in 1943 at the age of 17 ¹/₄, he volunteered and was subsequently accepted a for RAF aircrew training.

Having learned that there was a surplus of aircrew and he would not be required and due to his facility with Morse Code, he was transferred to the Army Y service.



He was trained initially in Japanese Morse and was due to be sent to the Far East when the war ended and he was instead sent to Europe, where he spent two years in Italy and Austria. On his return to England, he was asked to remain on as a civilian and spent his time at Beaumanor Hall, Leicestershire, which he did happily until leaving the army.

Stan subsequently joined the Electricity Board and remained with them for the rest of his working life. He worked his way up through the ranks as an Accountant and following much studying, became a Fellow of the Chartered Certified & Corporate Accountants and a Fellow of the Chartered Institute of Management Accountants.

Stan was passionate about helping his local community and held a number of voluntary posts over the years, including governor of Roundhills School for the disadvantaged, a governor of Kendal Technical College, a member of Natland Parish Council, a contributor to St Mark's PCC and a Sidesman in his local church for over 40 years. In addition to this, he was a member of the Rotary Club of Kendal for forty-seven years, becoming President in 1982. He was awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship for meritorious Rotary service.

He was a Trustee and later Chairman followed by Vice-President of The Lakeland Sinfonia Concert Society and greatly enjoyed assisting in providing South Lakeland people with high quality classical music.

He had a great interest in sports and was a lifelong supporter of Preston North End.

Stan's funeral took place in Kendal on 26th March 2022 and Stan will be sadly missed by his family and friends

Commemoration of ANZAC Day - 25th April.

The 5th Battalion of the New Zealand Rifle Brigade (NZRB) arrived on Cannock Chase in September 1917 and would stay there until returning to New Zealand in May 1919. The unit had been involved in fighting at the Battle of the Somme in September 1916 and the Battle of Messines Ridge in June 1917 and as such, was an experienced unit. This combat experience made them an ideal battalion to train new recruits at Cannock Chase, before they were sent as reinforcements to New Zealand battalions on the Western Front.

The Unit remained stationed Cannock Chase until their return home in 1919.

Possibly the most visible reminder of the presence of the New Zealanders on Cannock Chase is the number that are buried in the Cannock Chase War Cemetery. There are 379 burials in the cemetery, 73 of them being New Zealanders. Most of them would have died during the Spanish Flu Pandemic in 1918

The CWGC Cemetery at Brockton on Cannock Chase, Staffordshire, has long been the location of the largest commemoration of ANZAC Day (25th April) outside Australia and New Zealand and is attended by many dignitaries, representatives of ex-services organisations and is organised by the Stafford Branch of the Royal British Legion. A large number of RBL and other standards feature prominently during the service including performance of the 'Act of Homage' during the Last Post & Reveille and a 'Royal Salute' during the National Anthem.

Our Branch Standard has been paraded at the ceremony since at least 2016 and possibly earlier.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE 2022

Formation Staple Hill and District Branch and Gloucestershire County Motion 1

This Branch requests that the Board of Trustees and Director of Welfare provide clarification on current arrangements for Welfare breaks for beneficiaries.

Motion 2

Formation Portugal and Atlantic Islands Branch BR3443

That Honorary Membership of the Royal British Legion be automatically granted to any member attaining their Centenary. **Motion 3**

Formation Paris Branch, France – BR3441

Conference asks the Board of Trustees to allow proxy voting for branches at AGMs.

Motion 4

Formation Derbyshire – Chesterfield

Conference passes this motion to the Board of Trustees for action. To implement the use of Bank debit cards, if required, by Branches who are finding difficulty in paying bills by cheque.

Motion 5

Formation Lancaster Branch – BR1473

This Conference requests that the Board of Trustees request that "the printers" revert back to using paper-based card for the Legion Membership Cards.

Not a lot of people know that Johnny Cash was a Spec Op! Cash enlisted in the U.S. Air Force in 1950 and was assigned as a Morse intercept operator with the 6910th Security Group at Landsberg, West Germany where he intercepted Russian military radio transmissions. He reached the rank of sergeant before leaving the service. Over the next three years, between shift work Cash developed his singing skills, and following his departure from the service, went on to become one of this nation's most popular country music stars. The Air Force gave Cash his first steady pay cheque, \$85 a month, which he used to buy his first guitar. He was honourably discharged from the military in July 1954.

Here is an excerpt from his memoirs about his time as a signals intelligence (SIGINT) intercept operator

"The Air Force taught me the things every military service imparts to its en-



listed men ... plus one skill that's pretty unusual: if you ever need to know what one Russian is signaling to another in Morse code, I'm your man. I had such a talent for that particular line of work and such a good left ear, that in Landsberg, where the United States Air Force Security Service ran radio intercept operations worldwide, I was the ace. I was who they called when the hardest jobs came up. I copied the first news of Stalin's death. I located the signal when the first Soviet jet bomber made its first flight from Moscow to Smolensk; we all knew what to listen for, but I was the one who heard it. I couldn't believe that Russian operator. He was sending at thirty-five words a minute by hand, a rate so fast I thought it was a machine transmitting until I heard him screw up. He was truly exceptional, but most of his comrades were fast enough to make the best Americans sound like amateurs, sloppy and slow. It didn't matter, though. Our equipment was so good that they couldn't make a noise anywhere in the world without us hearing it. Our receiver worked pretty well bringing in WSM, too. Some Sunday mornings I could sit there in Germany and listen to Saturday night at the Grand Ole Opry live from Nashville, Tennessee, just like at home. I heard the enemy every day in the Air Force, but I never saw combat or even came close to it. I enlisted a week before the Korean War broke out, so I was already in the system, and once they'd discovered my aptitude, trained me, and assigned me to the Security Service, Korea wasn't an option. My only choice was between Germany and Adak Island, the Aleutian archipelago off Alaska. that wasn't hard: frozen everything or food and Frauleins? I chose Landsberg."
